Monday-Wednesday 11:30-13:00 Winter 2012 January-April	European	HIST 1207 -- Western Civilization: French Revolution to the Present An examination of significant themes and events in the history of Western society since the French Revolution. (lec 2, tut 1), cr 3	P.-A. Cavaliere
Tuesday-Thursday 11:30-13:00 Winter 2012 January-April	North American	HIST 1407 -- Canadian History: Post-Confederation An examination of the political, economic and social developments in Canada from Confederation to the present. (lec 2, tut 1), cr 3	K. Hall
Tuesday-Thursday 8:30-10:00 Winter 2012 January-April	European	HIST 2056 -- History of Ancient Civilizations to the Greeks A study of ancient civilizations from ancient Egypt to Hellenistic Greece. Students may not retain credit for both HIST 2056 and CLAS 2056. (lec 2, tut 1), cr 3	J.S. Liedl
Monday 19:00-22:00 Winter 2012 January-April	North American	HIST 2136 (formerly 3126) – A History of French Canada A survey of the history of French Canadians with special emphasis upon French minorities outside of Quebec. Students may not retain credit for both HIST 3126 and 2136. (lec 2, tut 1), cr 3	S. Dupuis
Tuesday-Thursday 16:00-17:30 Winter 2012 January-April	European	HIST 2426 -- Modern British History, 1700-1850 This course will survey the political, social, economic, and cultural history of the British Isles from 1700 to 1850. Students who have taken HIST 2407 may not take HIST 2426 for credit. (lec 2, tut 1), cr 3	D. Travers
Wednesday 19:00-22:00 Winter 2012 January-April	European	HIST 2567 (formerly 2307) -- European History Since World War II This course examines the new Europe that emerged from World War II. Central to this course will be an analysis of the new power structures relationships that reshaped the political, economic and social landscapes. Student may not retain credit for HIST 2307 or 2305 and 2567. (lec 2, tut 1), cr 3	D. Travers

Tuesday-Thursday 10:00-11:30 Winter 2012 January-April	Compulsory	HIST 3006 -- Approaches to Canadian History A lecture-seminar course designed for history majors and others with an interest in Canadian historical writing and research. Emphasis will be on the variety of interpretations, structures, concepts and research techniques. Prerequisites: a first year History course or the approval of the department. (A minimum grade of 60% is required for History majors.) (lec 2, tut 1), cr 3	L.M. Ambrose
Monday-Wednesday 13:00-14:30 Winter 2012 January-April	North American	HIST 3156 -- History of Education in Canada An introduction to the history of education in Canada from its origins in New France until the period following World War II. Topics for lectures and tutorials will focus on such central themes as the continuity of private initiatives, the formation of state education, the growth of the teaching profession, and the impact of class, race, and gender on educational experience. Particular attention will be given to the development of the public school system in Ontario. (lec 2, tut 1), cr 3	S. Burke
Tuesday - 3:00-14:30 Thursday-14:30-16:00 Winter 2012 January-April	North American	HIST 3166 (formerly 3306) -- History of Women in Canada An overview of women's experience in Canada up to contemporary times. Emphasizes the social, economic and political changes made in women's private and public roles, responsibilities and rights. Student may not retain credit for both HIST 3306 and 3166. (lec 2, tut 1), cr 3	L.M. Ambrose
Wednesday 14:30-17:30 Winter 2012 January-April	North American	HIST 4187 -- Modern Canada Since World War II This course explores in as much depth as time will allow the main themes and issues that have shaped post-World War II Canada. Topics include the post-war economic impact, immigration, the rise of the welfare state, the communications revolution, the American influence, the Quebec 'question', and Canada in the Cold War. Prerequisite: a related 3000-level course or the approval of the department. Students may not retain credit for HIST 4185 and 4187. (sem 3) cr 3	M. Kuhlberg
Friday 8:30-11:30 Winter 2012 January-April	European	HIST 4517 -- Later Medieval Chronicles The course explores the writing, use and understanding of historical records including biographies, autobiographies and chronicles in the Later Middle Ages. Prerequisite: at least 6 credits at the 2000 level in a related subject area. (sem 3) cr 3	J.S. Liedl
