

**PSYC 1105 E 02: Introduction to Psychology Dr. C. Whissell  
2006-2007**

**Text:** Coon & Mitterer “Introduction to Psychology: Gateways to Mind and Behavior”  
11<sup>th</sup> Edition (you need THIS edition – no old used books will work).

This course is taught in four Units

**Unit 1: Introduction, Brain, Development**

**Unit 2: Sensation, Perception, Consciousness, Learning**

**Unit 3: Memory, Cognition, Intelligence, Motivation, Emotion**

**Unit 4: Personality, Disorders, Therapies, Social Behavior**

Each unit includes one objective (multiple choice, matching, fill in the blanks, T-F) test at the end, covering all the material of that unit, and one lab. The final examination covers the entire course and is also an objective examination. Laboratory exercises will be conducted in class. The lab reports written for each lab will be in a standard essay-type format and will be about 1000-1500 words long (2-3 typewritten single-spaced pages).

**What your will be tested on:**

Each chapter is accompanied by a concept map and a concept review which are included in the “Concept Maps and Concept Reviews” booklet which is packaged with your text. Bring this booklet to class with you regularly. We will discuss the concept map/review for each chapter, and each chapter will also be accompanied by an Activity prepared by the professor. The concept maps, the reviews (in the form of multiple-choice questions) and the activities will guide your studies.

You should read each chapter as we study it (we go in order through the text, skipping a few chapters). You are responsible for the material in lectures, the concept maps and reviews, and the activities. Details NOT addressed in any of these three sources will not be tested.

Please note that the class is split (alphabetically) for testing purposes. All test dates have been determined and are included in the schedule.
