The School of Northern Development invites applications for two (2) tenure-track positions.

(1) A tenure-track appointment in **Aboriginal Health** with a research focus on health policy, elder health, urban Aboriginal health or the health benefits of Indigenous lifeways, medicines and philosophies at the rank of Assistant Professor, beginning July 1, 2014. The successful candidate will be expected to teach courses in Anthropology at the undergraduate level, and contribute to graduate programs such as the M.A. in Human Development, the Masters in Indigenous Relations and the Ph.D. in Rural and Northern Health. There will be opportunities for partnerships with the future Faculty of Health and the Northern Ontario School of Medicine (NOSM).

(2) A tenure-track appointment in **Development Anthropology** with a focus on Indigenous land-use, economic sustainability, traditional ecological knowledge, environmental impact assessments, Aboriginal law and/or applied anthropology at the rank of Assistant Professor, beginning July 1, 2014. The successful candidate will be expected to develop new courses in Anthropology reflecting his or her expertise. There will be a significant opportunity to integrate classroom learning with real-world experience, for example, through projects and placements in Aboriginal communities, to create partnerships with the Goodman School of Mines and to contribute to graduate programs including the proposed M.A. in Northern Economic Development. Experience with the mining industry, the forestry industry and/or Aboriginal communities in Northern Ontario would be an asset.

Applicants must have a completed Ph.D. or be near to completion, with demonstrated research productivity and teaching experience. Candidates should submit a statement of current and prospective research, a teaching dossier, a curriculum vitae, and three letters of reference to brock@leadersinternational.com.
